400,000 Boys Scouts

To Work on the Third Liberty Loan as Cleaners After the Reapers.

The full strength of the Boy Scouts of America, numbering nearly 400,000, with their adult leaders, has been called out by President Wilson to conduct a nation-wide intensive Liberty Loan campaign.

This campaign will be a "clean-up" house-to-house canvass, just before the close of the general campaign.

The Scout campaign will open on Saturday, April 27, thus making it possible to have two Saturdays within the period of the Boy Scout campaign.

The Scouts will make sure that no one is overlooked, and will also give subscribers an opportunity to take out just a little bit more. The Boy Scouts of America, as a distinctive service to their country, will work as "Cleaners after the Reapers." The primary motive of this Boy Scout campaign is to serve our country and help win the war.

The plan of having the Boy Scouts campaign at the end of the regular campaign in a house-to-house canvass is the particular service that has been assigned to the Boy Scouts of America by the United States Treasury Department, the President, in a letter to National Scout Master Livingston, calls for the mustering of the full strength of the organization in this campaign.

FARMINGTON CELEBRATES

Tomorrow (Saturday) Will Witness the Dedication of Farmington's Honor and Service Flags

Arrangements have been perfected for a big day in this village tomorrow (Saturday, April 27th), when a fine display will be raised on the Town Hall lawn, and Farmington township's Honor Flag, recently presented to us by the government for being the first township in Oakland county to oversubscribe our quota in the third Liberty Loan.

The Service Flag, containing 25 stars, representing our boys overseas and at training camps, will be hoisted to the breezes in a fitting manner.

The stores and business places have all signified their willingness to close from 2 to 4 o'clock, and the program will begin with the pole raising under the direction of Amos Otis, music to be furnished by the Farmington Cornet Band.

At 2 o'clock, under the direction of Mrs. Inda Hambleton, the flags will be presented and raised to their position by a bevy of school girls. Mrs. Hambleton will also have charge of the singing by the pupils of our schools.

Following the ceremonies of flag and pole raising Gov. Albert E. Sleeper, of Lansing, will give a patriotic talk, the principal address to be given by Abner E. Larned, of Detroit, who has just returned from a trip to France and a visit with our boys at the front, he having been a passenger on the ill-fated troop ship, *Tuscania*, sunk by a submarine.
