

Meeting
By virtue of the order and di-
rection of the District Board of
School District No. 5, Farmington
Township, Oakland Co.,
Michigan, Notice is hereby
given that a special meeting of
said School District will be held
at the School House in Farming-
ton, in said district on Tuesday
the 14th day of May, 1918, at
seven o'clock p. m. Central Stan-
dard Time. For the purpose of
submitting to the qualified elec-
tors of said district, the proposi-
tion to borrow the sum of Fifteen
Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) and
to issue the bonds therefore,
bearing interest at a rate not to
exceed 4% per annum, payable
semi-annually, said bonds to be
of the denomination of One
Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each,
and to mature as follows: One
Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) on
March 1st, of each year from
1921 to 1932 inclusive, and Three
Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) on
March 1st, 1933. Said bonds to
be used to defray the expense of
completing and equipping a new
school building, in the village of
Farmington, in said district.
The polls for said election are to
be open for two consecutive
hours. Notice is hereby given

district has estimated the amount
necessary to defray the expense
of bringing to completion and
equipping said new school build-
ing to be the sum of Fifteen
