## Cranbrook Announces Artists Schedules

The schedule of visiting artists to the Painting Department of Cranbrook Academy of Art was announced today by Glen Paulsen, Director of the Academy.

Johns Olttski, Esteban Yvenne and Jack Bush are the eminent artists who will be visiting the Academy during the 1968-1969 school year.

Olttski is among the foremost of today's color-field painters. He was recently featured in the Art section of Time Magazine with three of his large-scale canvases being reproduced in color.

The Russian-born, raised-in-Brooklyn artist is one of three or four artists who represented the United States in the 1965 Venice Biennale. He is currently planning one-man shows in London, Los Angeles and New York.

Olttski will be in residence at the Academy the first part of December and again, during the spring semester, in the latter part of April.

He has won many honors including the Grand Award from Montreal Museum of Fine Art and the 1968 Guggenheim Award in Painting.

The Toronto-born Olttski has had one-man exhibitions in London, New York, Toronto and Bennington College, Vermont. He has participated in group exhibitions in Europe and was one of two artists representing Canada in 1967 at the IX Biennial, Sao Paulo, Brazil.

Bush will be at the Academy the first two weeks in February. The appearance of these visiting artists at the Academy is typical of the Academy's whole approach to teaching. Its pilot system has been lauded for its philosophic approach with practical results.

Built upon the master-apprentice tradition, the system encourages an intimate relationship between students and faculty. Instruction is predominantly counseling, direct and informal, on a person-to-person basis.
