PASSING OF THE HORSE

Will the horse ever become extinct? This question has been the subject of much conjecture. The most correct answer lies in the fact that we live in an age when the horses are getting fewer.

The number of horses shipped from the U. S. to Europe, for army service, is appalling, and is slowly draining our horse markets of its best stock. The tractor is taking the horses' place with the big farmers, but the farmers who are still equipped with horses declare that they have no horses to sell as the original lot of horses must stay on the farm. What will be the outlook for the horse in another 50 years to come?

The metropolitan fire team, with their wild and dashing clatter, has been in many places supplanted by the still faster motorwagon. When the automobiles first came out it was said that they would never outnumber horses. This was many years ago, but today we can count more autos in 20 minutes than we see horses all day long.

A story is told of a farmer who sold off all his old horses and who was going to buy a bigger team, but when the spring work began, he had to buy all his same horses back again, as he could not find a team he wanted.

It is most probable, with the advancing price of horses, that in another 50 years the horse will be a curiosity on our American streets and farms.

Italy Has "State Sugar."

Especially drastic regulations govern the use of sugar in Italy. Its manufacture, distribution and sale are closely controlled, and in part actually taken over by the state.

Saccharine is permitted to be sold and used as a substitute for sugar and the government manufactures a mixture of saccharine and sugar, called "State Sugar," which is largely used.

German Sugar Ration Adequate, Germany, before the war, produced a great surplus of sugar and exported large quantities. Today the Germans have virtually gone out of the export business, but have plenty of cheap sugar for home use.

Wholesale prices prevalent in the Allied nations, according to information received by the United States Food Administration are as follows: England, 10 cents a pound; France, 12 cents; Italy, 28 cents.

While these high prices are being paid abroad the American wholesale price is being held at 7 1/2 cents.
