

Police reserve battle settled

Farmington Public Safety Officers and their director reached a tentative settlement Wednesday over the implementation of new guidelines for the department's reserve force.

Those guidelines allowed the reserves to perform duties normally handled by regulars and would circumvent the law, intruding upon a full-time officers' primary responsibilities, the public safety officers claimed in their suit against the city. The partial agreement was reached last week after a three-day hearing in Oakland County Circuit Court before Judge Farrell Roberts.

sought a court injunction preventing Director Daniel Byrnes from allowing reserves to answer routine police and fire calls while on duty, officers said before the hearing last week.

"We went before the judge, presented our arguments and a decision was rendered. The judge asked us to come to an agreement on our difference of opinion as to the interpretation of the guidelines," Byrnes said, hedging to reveal the actual results of the hearing.

"AS FAR AS I'm concerned, it was only a matter of differing opinions. We're reasonable people in this department and we discuss our problems.

"Right now we are attempting to resolve the problem and reach some kind of a mutual agreement on the reserve guidelines the department wrote down several weeks ago," he continued.

Byrnes said both sides have decided to withhold information about the matter until they reach a written agreement.

He also anticipates to have that written agreement ready sometime this week.

The difference of opinion concerning the guidelines came into focus two weeks ago when the officers said it permitted reserves to do police functions.

Under the guidelines as issued before the hearing, reserves would ride alone on patrol without a regular in the car, according to police association president Peter Amato.

Amato said this provision upset the officers and sparked their move to take the city to court to fight the guidelines. Byrnes said he hopes to discuss the guidelines with the officers at a department meeting next week in order to reach an agreement on the reserves functions.



Armed robbery suspect

Farmington man shot

Royal Oak Police wounded an armed robbery suspect Wednesday night in Southfield.

The suspect, William R. Jackson, 27, of 2615 W. Meach in Farmington was arrested late Friday afternoon in his hospital bed at Providence Hospital in Southfield. He is listed in fair condition and is under police guard.

Jackson was observed by a Royal Oak surveillance team holding up the Total Gas Station at 2808 Northwestern Highway when Jackson fled from the scene and failed to stop for officers, he was shot.

The Royal Oak team had been observing the suspect all day, police said. The suspect was arrested by Southfield Police after the first robbery at the Total Gas Station at Eight Mile and Shawansee Road.

Two other gas station robberies occurred the same night in Southfield. Four other suspects have been arrested.

Two black males were arrested by Southfield Police after the first robbery at the Total Gas Station at Eight Mile and Shawansee Road. The two suspects, police said, demanded all the station attendant's money and then fled. Police captured the suspects, confiscating \$20 and two handguns. Strong hold is Michael Miller, 25, of 2221 Trojan in Detroit and a juvenile. Preliminary examinations for the suspects have been set for July 26 at 1:30 p.m.

Another hold-up allegedly occurred at The Huffman Golf Station, 2825 Nine Mile Road, police said. Two white males were arrested by police while the hold-up was in progress. A saved-off shotgun was confiscated.

The two arrested suspects were Mark S. Lieberman, 19, of 2661 Old Ham Road and Irvin Lee Rogers, 18, of 2688 Brooks Lane. Both live in Southfield.

The preliminary examinations for both teens are July 27 at 1:30 p.m.

Police do not believe there was any connection between the three robberies, said Alton L. Brown, press information representative.

However, police are looking into the possibility that one of the Wednesday night robberies are connected with the armed robbery of a Clark Gas Station Monday night.
