He pointed to Southfield's Civic Center development as an example of what can be done. The Southfield facility is 170 acres, which includes the city's city hall and police department facility

Gaynor sees little difficulty in the coun-cil adopting the master plan.

Also located at the site is a skating rink, parks and recreation center, tennis courts and a parks and recreation center.

Gaynor believes that much of the dis-sension over developing large parks is the concept that they would be something like the Middle Roughe Parkway, slong Edward Hines Drive.

"WE COULD NEVER DEVELOP some-thing like that in Farmington Hills. The problem with something like Edward Hines is that it doesn't have any facilities.

"If a master plan is done properly there is no reason why the council would want to reject it. What a master plan does is show that the community is serious about devel-oping parks." he said.
