

## CONGRESSIONAL CANDIDATES

Voters in greater Rochester will have 10 congressional candidates from which to choose in the Aug. 3 primary election. The field of five Democrats and five Republicans is one of the state's largest and represents a broad range of political philosophies.

In the Democratic ticket are James Scandrio, Kim Moran, David Bonior, John Bowman and Charlotte Boyd. Republicans include Lawrence Zatkoff, William Prober, Larry Lark, David Seretkin and Eugene Tivla.

Winners of the primary election will move on to face each other in the November general election.

## NEWS BLACKED OUT?

The FBI said they have a suspect in the gun shot slaying of Debevoise physician Cynthia Miller.

In the wake of a Southfield Police Department announcement that it was backing out of further media coverage of the murder investigation, an FBI spokesman said the suspect is believed to be outside of Michigan.

Dr. Miller was killed in her car on 148th near Inlet Road in Southfield. The suspect, Gordon Winkard, escaped from Southern Michigan Prison in Jackson and is said to have killed Dr. Miller when she was a prison physician there.

## UPDATING TAX ROLLS

Birmingham officials this week taken initial steps to have every property in the city reappraised and updated on the assessment rolls.

Birmingham commissioners Monday proposed the city's legal counsel to review a proposed agreement with the Oakland County Equitization Department to conduct the reappraisal.

The proposed citywide review is thought to be the first since 1954, when Birmingham became a city.

## FACE TO FACE

Eleven of West Bloomfield Township's 13 candidates for local offices faced their constituents Tuesday night during the League of Women Voters' meet-the-candidates night.

About 100 residents turned out to hear the candidates' platform statements and question them on such issues as EMS (Emergency Medical Services), taxes, Northwestern Highway and cityhood for the township.

## READY TO ROLL

West Bloomfield school buses will roll pretty much as usual when school starts. The school board Monday reinstated its transportation policy and the majority of exceptions which have been granted in the past.

About 100 residents, most protesting any proposal for cutting back on busing, attended the meeting, which also included the board's approval of an \$8.8 million budget.

## A HELPING HAND

After being victimized by a band of robbers, 45-year-old Farmington resident Elise Sutton found she had some friends in town. The Farmington Public Safety Department collected \$100 to help the city's senior citizens pay her bills. She was robbed of \$30. Other city employees also are collecting funds to help her out.

## TROY BIDS ON TENNIS

The Troy City Council is examining bids for an air-supported tennis structure to be located behind the civic center. Three bids submitted bids which were opened July 12. The council plans to award the contract within 30 days.

## SHOPPING EXTRAVAGANZA

More than 200 merchants from greater

Rochester will offer local residents a host of activities and bargain prices on goods at the annual Sidewalk Sale Days Celebration, July 29 to Aug. 1. Two local shopping centers, Campus Corners and North Hill, plan activities that include amusement rides, demonstrations and musical performances at Campus Corners, and free meals, walk-in hair saloons and reduced prices on hot dogs and coke at North Hill.

The sales event is expected to draw crowds to the shopping centers and to Rochester's downtown business district as merchants roll their merchandise into the streets and slash prices on most items to cost or below cost.

## EMU raises '76 tuition

Those seeking a higher education at Eastern Michigan University will soon be paying more to get it.

The university's board of regents have approved a tuition increase that averages 10 per cent for undergraduates and graduate students who are residents of Michigan, two per cent for nonresident undergraduates and 14 per cent for nonresident graduate students.

The new rates are effective Sept. 1, 1976. Undergraduate students who are residents of Michigan will pay \$23 per credit hour, an increase of \$2.50 or 12 per cent for lower level students and of \$1.50 or seven per cent for upper level students over the current rate. Nonresident undergraduate students will pay \$50 per credit hour, an increase of \$1.50 or five per cent for lower level students and a decrease of 50 cents or one per cent for upper level students.

The differentiation between lower level (freshmen and sophomores) and upper level (juniors and seniors) undergraduate students has been eliminated in the new tuition plan. Graduate students who are residents of Michigan will pay \$33 per credit hour, an increase of \$3 or 10 per cent. Nonresident graduate students will pay \$60 per credit hour, an increase of \$10 or 14 per cent.

The Southeast Michigan Council of Governments has received a \$250,000 grant for urban mass transit planning from the U.S. Department of Transportation.

The grant money will support transit-related activities and allow for comprehensive transportation planning for the 1977 fiscal year.

SEMCOG officials called the award a "key grant" and said the \$250,000 would "enable them to do long-range transportation planning through the year 2000."
