State ups monitors on doctors' practices

The next time a Michigan doctor feels inclined to rush through an examination or desk out a sloppy diagnosis, he would do well to remember that the state's medical practice board is watching him—and the board has just been given more authority.

A bill recently signed into law by Gov. William Milliken amends the medical practice act and is the compromise developed following the governor's veto of an earlier bill amending the act.

"This bill meets my earlier objections and establishes a workable mechanism to reduce professional misconduct. The majority of Michigan doctors are highly skilled professionals and the law will help remove from their ranks those few who are not competent to practice medicine," Milliken said.

The new law:

- Adds two public members to the medical practice board.
- Requires eight, rather than four, regular board meetings each year.
- Allows the board to initiate its own investigations.
- Establishes a procedure for hearing complaints.

• Establishes new relicensing procedures and application fees.

• Requires review of a licensee's file if there is some question about his performance.

• Requires a decision by the board within 60 days after receipt of information on whether or not to institute disciplinary proceedings.

• Requires the board to report suspensions, limitations or any action against doctors to the department of public health, malpractice insurance companies, the department of social services, professional societies and appropriate licensed health facilities.

The administrative deficiencies in the earlier measure, which I voiced are corrected in this law," Milliken said.

He added, "The state's ability to monitor the medical profession is enhanced and the public is assured that doctors are performing their duties in accordance with the highest professional standards."

"Government can never let down its guard against potential future malpractice crises in Michigan. And to the extent that we can better monitor our medical professions and medical malpractice insurance availability and cost, we will improve our ability to head off such crises. The problem cannot be solved by any one piece of legislation, but requires constant vigilance."
