These tips can make your move easier

- A recent New Yorker cartoon depicts a young man resigning to a shocked boss because his wife is being transferred out of state.
- Even though not all marriages today are that egalitarian, thousands of families will move this year to accommodate shifting corporate needs. And whether the husband's or wife's job takes precedence, someone in the family will have to oversee the move, to plan and manage the move for a 25 or 100 miles.
- The Careers for Women department of Northwest Institute, Midland, offers some tips for surviving the strains of geographic transition — not so obvious tactics to be taken before the move in addition to the routine necessary arrangements for utility turn-offs, change of address notices to creditors and others.
- Subscribe to newspapers and regional magazines as soon as you learn your new destination. A little pre-study on the real estate and job markets, schools, taxes and shopping prices will counteract the other wise inevitable feelings of isolation in a new community.
- Try to schedule any medical dental — even veterans' — checkups for the family before you move. You'll be too busy after the move and you'll tend to put off the hunt for new health careers. And can your present doctor dental or vet recommend a professional friend in your new community? Ask him or her for a copy of your records. Taking-acting is better than write and wait for.
- Take care of all necessary auto repairs — for two reasons: (1) you'll want the car in top-top shape to drive to your new location, especially if it's a considerable distance away. Two it can be inspected by the repair people you've patronized and trusted.
- Take advantage of special services which might not be available in your new area. For example, do some early Christ-mas shopping at your favorite reliable factory outlet. Or frame those antique family photos at the downtown craft shop and avoid custom charges later on.
- Stock up on regional market foods which might not be sold where you move — that last bottled spaghetti sauce sold at the corner deli or specialty shop home canned pickles from the local gourmet shop.
- Obtain a phone directory of your destination town. Your local telephone business office may be able to oblige this request.
- If you're planning to work the move start your search as soon as you start house-hunting in your new town. Visit call or write to area schools, companies and employment services — permanent and temporary — to gain positive direction in your search.
- If you're a teacher, nurse or plumber learn what papers must be certified in order to be professionally employed in another state. You may not have to wait six weeks to substitute teach if you arrange for certification and interpret the usual lead time before you move.
- Tell everyone about your big move. You never know whose uncle will run an agency in need of a new account executive or whose sister has three potential baby-sitters (daughters or sons) just waiting for you.
- Prepare your resume and have copies pressed before you move. You'll have them ready to send at the first of a job possibility. Also, you'll be in the proper, positive frame of mind, an utmost prerequisite to success.
- And while you're doing business with the printer, why not draft a simple "welcome moved" newsletter with all the details of your new address and job assignments. I.e., "John is spearheading a new marketing campaign for toaster-ovens in the Yukon. Mary's been made head basketball coach at State U. We're converting a 100-year old barn into new living quarters."
- Send them to the many friends you've made in all your other moves. They'll love to hear from you. You'll avoid the gloomy prospect of transcribing the same message to thirty people. And with only one writing effort, just think of how many people will have to write back to you!
