Former Gordon Creek High School coach, Jeannine Cooke joins the YM swim staff this fall and will teach adult swim classes and a new class, competitive techniques.


Tryouts for new members of the YMCA team, "Farmington Flippers," will be held Sept. 18 at Mercy Center, at 7:30 p.m.

Fill 'er up

Self service tries drivers' nerves

Want to save a nickel on every gallon of gas? If you do, then better learn to pump your own.

The price of regular gasoline at the Spectra gas station in Farmington was 53 cents last week. This compared favorably to an average of 52 cents for regular at other area stations.

David Gordon of Livonia, who monitors the action at the Spectra pumps from an video screen in the pay phone booth across the street, says, "most of the gas pumpers are natural do-it-yourselfers."

"A LOT OF CUSTOMERS think they should be charged more on the price per gallon ought to clear along with the price of the previous sale and the number of gallons in the purchase."

When the price per gallon doesn't clear, they will start twisting screws on the side of the pump. "They don't have anything to do with it," Gordon says. "It's just a matter of a lot of them who start kicking the pump."

Gordon, who will be a freshman at Schoolcraft College this fall, admitted with just a trace of a smile that many of the customers are women.

Even though the instructions are clearly printed on the side of the pump, many customers come to Gordon for help. He recalls the man who started to back out with the pump still in his gas tank. He has

enough gas caps left behind to testify that more than a few persons are absent-minded.

THE VIDEO SCREEN SHOWS which pumps are in use, the number of gallons and the total sale, so when the customer comes up to the window with his money, Gordon is ready for him.

Gordon says most people are honest and a great many have the correct change. This is a cash only deal.


Gordon estimates that on weekends sales run to 6,000-7,000 gallons a day and somewhat less during the week.

Gordon has been on the job watching the pumps and the video screen for about a month now. He says it's been a good job for a model-builder like himself.

In the quiet moments when the screen was blank, he completed his model of the United States Pacific fleet.

Gordon said, "Some of the guys sit here and listen to rock music, some may read comic books. I built the Pacific fleet."

And, of course, he tended to business in the booth, so had a few laughs besides—not all of them—at the expense of the opposite sex.



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
