

**THE UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN EXTENSION SERVICE**

Established in 1911 as a Lecture Bureau, the University Extension Service has for some 65 years been making the services and resources of The University of Michigan available to residents of the state — all over the state.

In 1913, a course program was inaugurated in Detroit on petition of 1,700 persons, most of them school personnel. The course program was soon expanded to other communities. Hundreds of courses enrolling thousands of students for graduate credit (and some for undergraduate credit) are now offered annually throughout the state.

Most are scheduled at the regional Extension Service and Graduate Study Centers in Detroit, Dearborn, Flint, Grand Rapids, and Saginaw. Noncredit courses are also offered, primarily in southeastern Michigan. Courses and conferences are scheduled state-wide in the Firemanship Training Program, established more than 30 years ago, and in the Real Estate Program, established in 1948. Both programs carry certificate credit.

**TODAY, THE** various units of the Extension Service are Lectures and Program Planning, Course Programs, Firemanship Training, Real Estate Program (all of these already mentioned), Conferences and Institutes, Independent Study, Community College Services, Extension Gaming Service, Community

Services, Cultural Activities, and the Office of Information.

In developing their many programs, these departments work with virtually every school and college of The University, including the University of Michigan-Dearborn and the University of Michigan-Flint.

The Extension Service welcomes inquiries about any of its programs and services.

**BIRMINGHAM COURSE SCHEDULE, FALL 1976**

Courses are scheduled in Birmingham through the Dearborn Regional Center of the University of Michigan Extension Service. With the exception of the professional courses in insurance, each course carries graduate credit for qualified students. Courses in management and psychology carry credit in the Rackham Graduate School; the engineering courses carry credit in UM-Dearborn's Professional Development in Engineering Degree Program.

Fees for credit courses are \$44 a credit hour for graduate students; \$40 a credit hour for undergraduates. Fees for certificate courses vary with length of the course and the type of instruction.

Registration may be made at the Birmingham Center for Continuing Education from 3:00 - 7:00 p.m. on Friday, September 10, or at the classroom immediately prior to the first session. Fees

must be paid by personal check or money order payable to the University of Michigan.

**COLLEGE OF LIFELONG LEARNING WAYNE STATE UNIVERSITY**

Not too many years ago adults were reluctant to return to the classroom because they were too old or because they did not wish to be the only "older" student.

Today much of that feeling is changed. Presently in the United States there are more part-time students than full-time students, more "older" students than younger ones.

Wayne State University's College of Lifelong Learning was founded in 1973 to serve such students. Most CLL students are over 21, and most work full time.

To accommodate such persons, CLL's classes are held throughout the metropolitan area, mainly in the evening.

For those who wish to earn a degree, there is CLL's unique University Studies/Weekend College Program. Utilizing televised instruction, discussion groups, and weekend conferences, the program leads to a Bachelor of General Studies degree.

For others not seeking a degree, CLL has a wide array of educational opportunities and learning experiences. Some courses prepare persons for new careers, others update their knowledge and skills for their present position.

Wayne State University welcomes the opportunity to participate in this new Center and has initiated its schedule with courses from the College of Liberal

Arts, School of Business Administration and School of Social Work. In addition, non-credit programs will be offered through CLL's Applied Management and Technology Center and University Courses in Adult Education.
