

# MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY

At the Birmingham Center for Continuing Education-Barnum, Michigan State University will supplement the educational opportunities of the people of the community and area.

As it has for more than 20 years, the University extends its resources to Southeastern Michigan in credit courses and other activities. Its Continuing Education Service regional center in Kingswood School-Cranbrook, Bloomfield Hills, serves Oakland, Wayne, Macomb, and St. Clair counties.

Groups and individuals with educational needs are invited to contact MSU's regional director, Dr. Charles L. Jackson, at the MSU regional center or its branch office in the Barnum School.

Registration for MSU fall term credit courses, including 36 at the Birmingham center and 31 others in the region, will continue through Thursday, Sept. 16, with the regional office open 8 a.m.-8 p.m. and the Barnum branch office open evenings.

MOST OF these courses will begin the week of Sept. 20 and continue for 10 weeks with one three-hour evening session per week. Some will have more concentrated schedules, and others will meet only on weekends.

While many have been scheduled for educators, most are open to all graduate students, and some may be taken for undergraduate credit. In addition to education, the subject areas include medicine, biology, criminal justice, child development, music, geography, psychology and social work.

Students may enroll for these courses on a credit basis without being admitted to an MSU program of study. To do so, they should complete an Application for Registration for One Term Only off-campus—non-degree status. If they wish to be admitted to a program, they can get assistance in the process from the regional staff.

Almost all of the credit courses do not involve costs beyond the fution which the Board of Trustees has set at \$28.00 per credit hour. Fees for noncredit classes will vary. Students may use their BankAmericard or Master Charge privileges at the regional center or with MSU center staff at Bannum.

WINTER TERM courses will be announced in December with registrations and class openings in January.

Noncredit activities will be announced as they are scheduled.
