

Competitive events to feature old cars

Imagine a village green alive with the sounds of pristine pioneer automobiles. A Davland band and the excitement of competitive events. That scene awaits visitors to Greenfield Village's Old Car Festival on Saturday and Sunday.

The festival begins each day at 12:30 p.m. with a parade through the village of antique cars and 1800s highwheel bicycles. Featured events on the Activities Field are 1917 to 1925 cars on Saturday, late 1800s to 1916 cars on Sunday. Such contests as crawling and balloon and potato slinging, competitors pit steamers, electric and gasoline horseless carriages against one another and also test the mettle of the costumed drivers and passengers.

When not performing, the roughly 300 antique cars and about 100 antique bicycles shown by members of the Wheelmen will be on display in the village.

At 2:15 each afternoon, members of the

Wheelmen, a national organization of antique bicycle collectors whose members will travel from several states for this event, will demonstrate the riding of 1800s highwheel bicycles. During Saturday's demonstration, the 23 riders who completed a 750-mile bi-centennial highwheel bicycle tour that left Henry Ford Museum July 4 and arrived in Philadelphia July 14, will receive recognition medals.

Another highlight on the Activities Field will be a race against the clock by the Canadian Model T Assembly Team which will convert a pile of parts into an operating Model T Ford in minutes.

EACH DAY of the festival, special guests will be honored by Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum. On Saturday, Richard A. Teague, vice-president of automotive styling for American Motors

Corp. and recipient of the 1974 Automotive Industries Magazine Career Achievement Award, will be honored among his many styling triumphs in the Pacer.

On Sunday, in observance of the 50th anniversary of the Pontiac automobile, Alex C. Mair, general manager Pontiac Motor Division and General Motors Corp. will accept the recognition of the village and museum.

Throughout the weekend 1928 Pontiac number one, a 1908 Oakland, fore-runner of the Pontiac, a 1932 Pontiac V-8 and a 1975

Pacer will be on exhibit in the center of the Activities Field. Also at the Activities Field will be displays of porcelain license plates, auto emblems, motor thalers, hub caps, spark plugs and Pontiac memorabilia and a demonstration of the craft of making wooden automobile wheels.

There is no additional charge for the Old Car Festival on Saturday and Sunday in Dearborn beyond the regular Greenfield Village admission for adults and for individuals 6 through 12 years of age. Persons under six are admitted free.

Bus goes to village

Hop aboard the Greenfield Village Express bus on Saturday at Pontiac Mall Shopping Center and travel nonstop to the Old Car Festival in historic Greenfield Village, Dearborn.

More than 300 antique automobiles recapture the fun and excitement of motoring's early days at the antique auto event.

Greenfield Village Express passengers can wander the cobblestone streets of Greenfield Village, view 100 historic buildings spread over 260 acres, visit Swanee Park, plus take in a portion of the Old Car Festival.

Each ticket includes round trip transportation from Pontiac Mall plus Village admission. Total package is priced for adults for persons 612, and for persons under 6. All individuals under 12 must be accompanied by at least one adult. Be a member of a group with an adult supervisor.

Passengers can park at the mall by 9:45 a.m. and depart on a charter coach at 10 a.m. and return to the mall by 4 p.m. Tickets are on sale at Grunell's Pontiac Mall.

Lithuanian history shown in exhibit

Lithuanian Americans are celebrating the bicentennial with a special exhibit in the Hall of Nations of the International Institute in Detroit.

The celebration will open with a dinner reception and program Sunday in the Hall of Nations. Each item of the menu is being prepared by members of the committee.

The exhibit will feature artifacts brought over at great personal risk to the Lithuanians who fled their country in search of freedom, according to an exhibition spokesman.

The ancient capital of Lithuania, Vilnius is found near the geographic center of Europe. From there the distances to the Urals, the Pyrenees, northern Norway and southern Greece are equal.

BECAUSE OF its geographical situation Lithuania acquired characteristics of western and eastern cultures. Lithuania halted the Teutonic Ordins' expansion in eastern Europe and the Tartar invasion of western Europe.

The ancient Lithuanians called Aests (Aesti Baltis), used a language unmistakably Aryan and related to Sanskrit, their tales bearing resemblance to early Greek and Indian literature. The had accepted Christianity from Rome in 1322.

The first Lithuanian king, Mindaugas, was crowned by the authority of Pope Innocence III in 1253. It was then that Lithuania became recognized as a Christian kingdom. In the 15th century, Lithuania was one of the most powerful kingdoms in Europe.

About 3,000 B.C. Lithuanian Amber known as Lithuanian Gold, was used by natives in trade. It had been a hallmark of their wealth, used by natives in trade. It has been a hallmark of their wealth used both as adornment and as works of art. There are many examples of this.

An example of this would be the wood sculpture "Pieta" by an unknown artist in the early 19th century, or a collection of evil spirits and devils very characteristic of the folklore and tales of morality. These tales point to the depth of feeling of the people when their God is denied them then evil takes over.

A great number of local Lithuanian artists are showing examples of their work in the exhibition. Among them are paintings of Richard Bilaitis, art professor at Wayne State University, ceramics of Regina Alkeviciene, wood carvings of Viktoras Velska, delicate stone creations of Antanas Janyniene, weavings of Juozas Jasunas. There will be many examples of dolls to illustrate the lives of the people done by Mrs. Katalute Kirvelaitis.
