# Lathrup, Southfield triumph

Southfield-Lathrup football coach Darrell Harper had said before the season that he expected "good strength up the middle" with fullback Chris Schultz and quarterback Joe Wissing leading the way. Harper's expectations were realized last Friday night as Lathrup's offense, powered by Schultz and Wissing, rolled up 253 total yards and defeated Birmingham Seaholm, 20-0, in a non-league game played on Lathrup's field.

Lathrup gained 178 yards on the ground with Schultz — a 6-2, 186-pound senior — picking up 121 on 20 carries. He scored the Chargers' first touchdown on a short run in the second quarter. Wissing, who missed all of last season because of a broken ankle, scored two more TDs on runs of four and five yards.

The 6-3, 190-pound Wissing also displayed a good passing arm, completing five of 12 passes for most of Lathrup's 75 air yards.

Lathrup's defense also looked impressive, holding Seaholm to 90 yards on the ground and a minus one yard passing. In fact, it was the defense which provided the Chargers with their first scoring opportunity.

Schultz's 49 left in the first half, senior tackle Hank Knapp pounced on a Seaholm fumble on the 50-yard line. Schultz then cracked off runs of 13, 10 and 12 yards before going over for the one.

Another fumble recovery led to Lathrup's next touchdown late in the third quarter. Guard Bob Pyles came up with the ball on the Seaholm four, and Wissing scored on the next play.

Scott Thompson, a 6-0, 190-pound halfback, was a bright spot for coach Bob Hankin's Seaholm squad. Thompson gained 56 yards in 12 carries.

**Southfield-Groves**

The Southfield High-Birmingham Groves football game last Friday was a defensive struggle until the Blue Jays exploded for four touchdowns in the second half to whip the Falcons, 26-0, in the non-league contest.

Southfield, which gained 161 yards on the ground and 93 more through the air, opened the scoring in the third quarter when John Blitzer, a senior halfback, plunged one yard for the TD.

The Jays added three more touchdowns in the fourth quarter. Mike Dougherty, a 6-2, 170-pound sophomore, ran nine yards for one score. Seconds later, Dave Moss dashed 20 yards with an intercepted pass for another TD. Southfield's last touchdown came on a six yard pass from quarterback John Vign to Scott Bremner.

Groves logged four first downs, two on passes, and gained 56 yards on the ground and 21 more through three pass completions.

**N Farmington-Pontiac Northern**

North Farmington running back Tim Quinn, a sophomore, has a bright football future ahead of him if his performance against Pontiac Northern High last Friday night is any indication.

North Farmington defeated Northern, 13-6, and Quinn was the leading ground carrier, picking up 130 yards in 14 carries and two kickoff returns. He also scored a touch-

down on a 22-yard run, and then kicked the extra point. North quarterback Mike Thomas scored a second quarter touchdown on a one-yard run.

North Farmington's seven first downs came through rushing plays. The Raiders gained 135 yards on the ground and five through the air. Thomas completed one of five attempts.

North Farmington defensive standouts included linebacker Greg Miller, who had 12 solo tackles, and Gus Patek and Mark Shulte with six each. Andy Salinas and Mark Thompson each intercepted a pass.

Pontiac Northern's touchdown came in the third quarter when a tackle picked up a fumble and ran 60 yards for the score. The victory was North Farmington's first since Sept. 21 of last year when it beat Walled Lake Central.
