

Hawks face test at Northville

Harrison smacks Canton, 47-6

State-rated Farmington showed to everyone at Plymouth's Centennial Park football field why it is the favorite to win yet another Western Six League title.

This season when the Hawks demolished the Plymouth Canton Chiefs 47-6 Friday night.

The Harrison victory was its fourth straight against no defense, setting the stage for next week's conference show-down against the Northville Mustangs.

Northville, also undefeated in regular season action, came from behind to beat Livonia Churchill Friday afternoon, 17-12.

For the Chiefs, it was loss number three against only one victory. Canton has yet to win in the Western Six, but will have a good chance to end the skid when it travels to Walled Lake Western next Friday night.

As in all of the Hawks' victories so far this season, the powerful running of tailback Mike Bowden dominated action. Bowden carried the ball 22 times for 163 yards and two touchdowns.

"He is the best running back we've ever had," said coach John Herrington. "With other teams keying on him, it has been a help in opening our offense but we still like to give him the ball. He's fun to watch."

Harrison dominated the game from the beginning, scoring 14 points in the opening quarter.

But before the Hawks controlled the game, Herrington had to change his offensive strategy because of the play of Canton's new linebacker Scott Gaudwell. Gaudwell is a transfer student from Ohio who joined the Chiefs two weeks ago. Harrison tried to run Bowden to the short side of the field but Gaudwell was there to stop the penetration.

Herrington made the quick adjustment to rushing the ball away from the Chiefs' linebacker, and it was easy sailing after that.

"I thought we came out hating but they (Harrison) just leaned on us," said Chief mentor Dave Schuele.

As awesome as Harrison's offense was, totaling 352 yards in the night, the Hawks' defense was equal.

The Chiefs went into the game with the thought of throwing the ball more. But a combination of a swarming Hawk defensive rush and many breakdowns in Canton's pass protection led to the Chiefs' downfall.

Canton could manage but two first downs the entire game, while rushing for a total of 13 yards.

The only score of the night for Canton came late in the second period, after Harrison held a 28-0 lead.

Chiefs' quarterback rolled out of the pocket in an attempt to pass from his team's 37-yard line.

Harrison's defensive backs came up to stop him but left wingback Jim Meadows in the clear.

With the heavy Hawk rush closing in, the quarterback threw a wobbly pass that hit Meadows on the Hawk 20. Meadows carried it in.

"He threw that ball six miles high," said Schuele. "I didn't think it ever was going to come down."

But aside from that fluke play, Harrison rolled over the Chiefs at will. Bowden capped a 10-play 66-yard drive with a seven yard burst to score Harrison's first touchdown.

After recovering a misplayed punt, the Hawks found themselves in, endzone two minutes later. The Hawks traveled six plays and 27 yards with Bowden bashing over from the one.

A six yard scoring pass from quar-

terback Jeff Thorne to Brad Baché made the score 21-0 midway in the second period.

On Canton's next series, the Chiefs were forced to punt deep in its own territory, but the attempt was blocked and recovered by John Payne in the endzone.

Another poor execution of a Canton punt led to the Hawks' next score late in the third period. A bad snap from center gave Harrison good field position, and Thorne capitalized by hitting tight end Mike Cimbura from 11 yards out.

The Thorne to Cimbura combination clicked again in the fourth period from 22 yards out.

Reserve quarterback Brett Homocoe completed the romp late in the game with a one-yard sneak for the seventh touch down.

Homocoe, Harrison's extra point kicker converted on five of six attempts.

Farmington Mercy sinks Dominican

Farmington Our Lady of Mercy should have no trouble winning its 11th-straight Catholic League girls' swimming crown if its meet with Detroit Dominican last Thursday is any indication. Coach DeLores Yager's Mercy girls swamped Dominican, 69-14, in their Catholic League opener.

The victory was Mercy's second straight this season and its 125th in a row since 1966.

Some Mercy winners included Sue MacMillan (1:28 in the 100-yard breaststroke); Theresa Blanton (1:09 in the 100 backstroke); Sue Miller (1:09 in the 100 butterfly); Betty Leahy (1:26 in the 50 free); and Carol Kohn (2:29 in the 200 individual medley).

Farmington-Adover

Casey Ratliff won two individual events and swam on a winning relay to help Farmington High defeat Bloomfield Hills Adover 97-75 in a non-league girls' meet last Thursday night. Coach Mark Holdridge's Farmington team is 3-1 this season.

Ratliff won the 100 free (1:00.7) and the 50 free (1:27.5), and then teamed with Laurie Dahlstrom, Tara Richardson and Nancy Dahlstrom to win the 400 freestyle relay in 4:12.3. Farmington's Sue Sterling won the 100 breaststroke in 1:19.3. Farmington took the top three places in the 200 IM with Ellen Blanton winning in 2:30.5, Debbie Gregory taking second in 2:31.7 and Cathy Lewis landing third in 2:46.5.

Earlier last week Farmington stopped Westland John Glenn, 106-66, in a non-league meet. Ratliff set a variety record in the 200 IM with a 2:32.7 clocking. Farmington's 400 free relay (Ratliff, Richardson, Gregory and Laurie Dahlstrom) logged another variety record with a 4:07.3 showing.

Harrison-Canton

Farmington Harrison nipped Plymouth Canton, 87-40, in a Western Six League girls' swim meet last Thursday. Harrison's 600 free relay provided the winning margin by finishing first in 4:10.7. The relay included Linda Leahy, Lori Haffman, Cathy Rudel and Karen Rudel.

Harrison took seven other first places with the Rudel sisters each winning two. Karen won the 500 free (2:10.0) and the 100 back (1:08.3). Cathy won the 200 IM (2:29.3) and the 100 butterfly (1:05.1). Haffman won the 500 free in 6:06.6. Harrison's Denise Bolt won diving with 184.35 points, and teammate Doyle Joy won the 100 breaststroke in 1:24.1.

Earlier last week Northville defeated Harrison, 90-41, in another NSL meet. Cathy Rudel won the 100 IM in 1:03.8. Harrison is 2-4 overall this season.
