Land use and water quality will be discussed at the general assembly meeting of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments (SEMCOG) tonight at 7:30 p.m. in the Rogers ballroom of the Hotel Regency, Dearborn. The meeting is open to the public.
 Elected officials from member units of government will examine the proposed changes in the SEMCOG land use plan. Delegates will also review a draft map showing how SEMCOG's proposed plan would affect land use throughout the seven counties of southeast Michigan.
 The land use plan is central to SEMCOG's planning for transportation, water quality and housing. Following a 20-year review by SEMCOG's Council on Regional Development and its six-member executive committee, the plan text is expected to go before the general assembly in 1977 for an adoption vote.
