# Better watch out, Santa is coming

For the third year, a U.S. Post Office Substation will be located in the north cor-  
ner of Orchard Mall. West Maple at Orchard Lake Road in West Bloomfield for  
Wednesday, morning, needs.

The substation will open at 8:30 a.m. Mon-  
day & 6 a.m. & remain open from noon to 6 p.m. daily, except Sunday through Mon-  
day, Dec. 20.

The substation will limit its business to  
posting stamps and money orders, accord-  
ing to manager Sue Robert.

Last year, the substation served almost

1,000 customers and handled almost \$10,000

in postal business.

**IN ADDITION** to the postal substation,  
the mall will also host the arrival of Santa  
Claus at 11 a.m. Friday, Nov. 20, during  
tree lighting ceremonies to kick off the hol-  
iday season. Santa will set up residence in  
the north corridor.

West Bloomfield Township Clerk Betty  
West Dupree is scheduled to flick the switch  
to light the decorations. Also scheduled is a  
short music program by the West  
Bloomfield Community Chorus.

Open-day performances will also feature  
members of the Michigan Ballet Associa-  
tion performing excerpts from the "Nut-  
cracker Suite" at noon, 3 and 6 p.m.





Disillusioned with the downtown Detroit  
business climate and impressed by Oakland  
County's growth, Gaser Zaken has  
jumped from owning an elegant chop  
house to starting afresh with a Farmington  
Hills fast food restaurant.

Zaken recently moved to the sub-  
urban frontier, rather than the city, because he  
believed that Detroit's business  
climate was stagnating.

I know Detroit like the back of my  
hand. I like Detroit. When I get home on  
the east side, I just want a drink. I drive  
down there rather than go to someplace in  
the neighborhood, he said.

But there is no room for businesses to  
grow downtown. It's all built up.  
While he is in the process of moving, his  
former wife, Linda, is staying in the city. She  
is looking for a new home in the Hills to  
be near to his new venture, a Big Boy res-  
taurant on Ten Mile and Orchard Lake  
Road.

ONE OF THE REASONS for his move is  
the change he noticed in attitudes towards  
the downtown area.

It's not bad on Shady and Congress,  
where my restaurant is, he said. "But  
people hear about crime, and they don't go  
downtown. It's more of a name than fact."

He chose Oakland County as a new home  
on the advice of friends and acquaint-  
ances.

In two years, Oakland County has in-  
creased to two million people.

"They have to eat somewhere," he rea-  
soned.

He came to Farmington because he  
heard it was a nice growing community.

The move isn't the first that Zaken has  
made in his lifetime.

He came to the United States in 1954,  
after he married a American born wife  
in Palestine, Lebanon.

She helped him to get a job at the Lon-  
don Chop House, where she was employed  
as a bookkeeper.

"I started out washing dishes behind the  
bar," he recalled.

Eventually, he worked his way up to  
manager of the chop house, before buying  
his own place.

The chop house helped me a lot. It  
helped me meet people. I know politicians,  
lawyers, and all kinds of people. It  
helped me with my knowledge of business.

If when I came to Detroit, I  
went to the factory all I would know would be
