# Plenty to do, if you like the cold

When it's too cold for picnics and fishing but there's not enough ice on the lakes for angling, what can you do outdoors?

There are downhill skiing, cross-country skiing and muzzle-loaders' deer season, among other things.

**MT. BRIGHTON** became the first southeast Michigan to open its slopes for the season a couple of weeks ago.

Co-owner Gene Hill said the three-piece chair lift and associated run, as well as the beginner slope with five rope tows, are in operation.

We have been preparing all summer for a super season," said Hill. "We have improved our lower lodge. We've also added 200 ski rentals, bringing our total to 1700."

Supers will have a good base, said Hill because of the usual fine grooming and the resort's immense capacity for making snow.

Other spots to keep your eyes on are Mt. Holly, Alpine Valley, Mt. Grampan, Pine Knob, Irish Hills, Black Forest and Teeple Hill.



**Outdoors**

**CROSS-COUNTRY** skiing is growing in popularity. Not only does the skier get to see more open country, but the costs are much cheaper.

If you haven't tried it yet and don't know whether you want to invest in equipment, try renting at one of two spots—Kensington Metropark south of Brighton and Stony Creek Metropark near Rochester.

If you're equipped already, try any of

the other metroparks, the state parks or state recreation areas once the deer hunters have cleared out of the latter spots.

At Kensington, the ski touring center is at the golf course starter building on the west side of the metropark (use Kensington Road exit from I-96). It's open daily from 9 a.m. to sunset, snow conditions permitting.

You can rent a full set of equipment for \$4.50 a half day plus insurance and a returnable damage deposit. Haupp Campfires operates the service.

Skiing lessons are also available at \$3 an hour.

At Stony Creek Metropark, the ski center is at the Eastwood Beach site and is open Thursday through Sunday from 8 a.m. to sunset, snow permitting.

Fees are the same as at Kensington. To winter admission to the new Huron Clinton metroparks is free.

## MSU studies two-way TV

Researchers at Michigan State University will soon be demonstrating television and computer teaching systems linked by two-way cable.

Funded by a \$100,000 National Science Foundation (NSF) grant, the experiment could help to determine the future uses of two-way cable TV.

MSU's project, located in East Lansing, will provide part of the daily training of instructors by two-way television.

For Thomas Baldwin, one of the three investigators on the NSF project, said the experimental system is probably the most economically feasible of the few advanced systems now in existence.

The other principal investigators are Dr. Bradley Greenberg, professor of communication and telecommunication, and Dr. Thomas Math, assistant professor of telecommunication.

The system combines televised lectures, a small terminal on which the students press buttons to answer questions, and a computer which not only records the answers but generates its own replies to the students on the screen.

Two-way cable TV differs from one-way cable TV, which is available today in hundreds of U.S. communities by allowing a subscriber to transmit information back to a central point.

Two-way cable technology, said Baldwin, opens up a whole new range of services including per program pay TV, where the subscriber pays only for the programs he desires, teaching devices in the home for the handicapped, access to a computer for monitoring of utility meters and security systems.

The research, said Baldwin, examines a variety of two-way TV services which as technology progresses, could make two-way cable economically viable for many existing cable systems as well as those to be built in the future in urban areas.

Math, who is a lawyer, will also explore public policy problems and questions associated with the introduction of the system, he said.

Baldwin said there are only a handful of functional two-way cable systems in the U.S. However, in one city where

a two-way system has been in daily operation since 1973.

The city of Rockford was selected for the experiment because of its size, demographic mix and the facilities of Rockford Cablevision.

The special cable system hardware and computer programming for two-way communication was designed by Coxnet Scientific Corp. of Sarasota, Fla. Modifications of the system to meet the special demands of the MSU NSF team, which includes researchers in communication, public affairs, social science, advertising, economics, law, engineering and telecommunication, will demonstrate the system with an instructional program on prefire planning for the city's firefighters. Prefire planning was chosen because it is a high priority item in Illinois and in most every fire department across the country.

It involves a complete survey of major buildings so that in the event of fire, the firefighters will know where the occupants are located, understand the floor plan and recognize potential hazards inside and outside the building.
