Arts council does brochure

The Michigan Council for the Arts has published a brochure, "Show on the Road" listing the performances, exhibits and professional training seminars of seven large Michigan arts organizations.
These services are made available to communities throughout the state through funds voted by the state legislature to the Michigan Council for the Arts.

The brochure consists of a series of color posters describing the Outreach Programs of the participating organizations: the Detroit Institute of Arts, the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, the Grand Rapids Symphony Orchestra, Interlochen Center for the Arts, Meadow Brook Theatre, Michigan Artisan and Michigan Opera Theatre. Information is provided regarding the types of programs offered, their availability, special facilities required and the appropriate contact persons for each organization. Fees are usually determined on an individual basis depending upon many variables such as travel costs, number of persons involved, number of performances or size of exhibitions.

In some cases, the requests for "Show on the Road" service already exceed the availability of these very popular programs. However, in these instances where organizations cannot fulfill requests for 1976-77, the requestor's name and address will be added to a list for future consideration.

Wigs are available in all sizes, colors and styles, including page boy, wedge, gypsy, afro, fluff and others. The wigs are cleaned, disinfected and shaped and cut to fit the individual, according to the cancer society.

Hair replacements for children and men are also available. Hospital visits will be made to patients unable to reach the salon.

Persons interested in donating hair pieces to the American Cancer Society may risk a local unit for information on the nearest drop-off point. Wig donations are tax deductible.

Pat Monaghan heads Oakland Young GOP

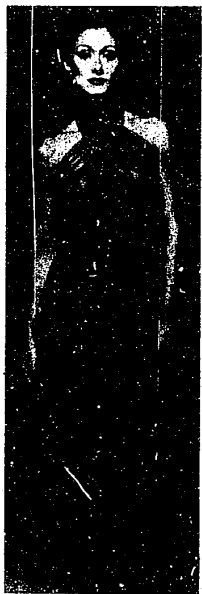
Pat Monaghan of West Bloomfield was elected chairman of the Oakland County Young Republicans at the club's December meeting at the Northfield Hilton in Troy.
