## Curling history to be re-enacted

Orchard Lake, the site of the coun-try's first organized curling club, will again resound to the slap of the broom and the knock of stone on

The Birmingham Department of Parks and Recreation and the Or-chard Lake Scenic and Historical So-ciety are co-sponsoring a reincatment of this early curling event, 1:30 through 5 p.m., Jan. 16. Curlers from the Birmingham Curling Club will provide the leadership in this ancient sport.

The exhibition will take place on the lake near the Orchard Lake Commu-nity Church on Commerce Road, be-tween Orchard Lake and Hiller roads in the northwest corner of the lake.

The Orchard Lake Club, the first or-ganized curling club in the United States, was founded in 1831. Two of the early stones used by the club in the 1860's are now in the American Curling Historical Museum in Chi-cago.

THE INITIALS "O.I.C." are chiseled into those historic granite stones. The teakettle-shaped stones, the best of which are made of alias craig stone, weigh 40 pounds each and cost up to \$270 a pair.

Alias stone, according to experts, is an aplitica takaline igneous pluton composed of feldspar, quartz and pleochrolic soda ambibole-riebecktle of pockolitic texture.
