The Michigan Association For Chil-dren With Learning Disabilites will host Dr. W. Dorsey Hammond in a free lecture at 8 p.m. Jan. 27 in Farm-ington Community Library on Twelve Mile. His topic is "The Reading Proc-ess."

Dr. Hammond has spoken in the In-ternational Reading Conference (IRA) and has written for journals on the subject. He is best known for his de-velopment of the "Directed Reading. Thinking, Activity Process," (DRTA) and is abeliever that everyone can learn to reach the second seco learn to read.

In his talk he will relate his theory on "how to make thinkers readers and get readers to thinking." His lectures are geared "for what-ever your role: special education teacher, classroom teacher, parent or student," said Ruth Schade, president of the Farmington chapter of MACLD.

Dr. Hammond is currently a profes-sor of reading in Oakland University. He received his training at the Univer-sity of Delaware, where he worked with Ruissell Stauffe, one of the six outstanding reading researchers in-the United States.
