## Register now for Cville classes

The Clarenceville school district is taking registrations for its spring term of adult education classes which start next Monday, Jan. 31. High school completion courses will start the week of Feb. 7.

The adult education program includes several new courses this year, said Harold Humble, administrative assistant to the superintendent.

They are square dancing, taught by Jim and Pat Tait, and ballroom dancing. Both will be in the junior high cafeteria, on Middle Belt north of Seven Mile.

Other courses will be cake decorating, career development, lapidary, silversmithing, painting, shorthand, typing, and swimming.

Swim class registration will be for students Saturday, March 5, from 9-11 a.m. in the high school pool with adult spring classes sign-ups scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Monday, March 14.

The programs, open to non-residents, will be held either in the senior high or junior high.

HUMBLE SAID that English and social studies classes will be offered in the high school completion program without charges, except for book fees. Classes will begin next week with the English course held on Mondays and Thursdays and the social studies class on Tuesdays and Wednesdays.

The classes will be for two hours each night for 15 weeks. Enrollment forms are available at the Clarenceville school board offices, on Eight Mile, east of Middle Belt, or during the first two classes.

The school district is also offering the "do something different" program which meets at 7 p.m. Wednesdays for eight consecutive weeks, starting Feb. 2.

The subjects are astrology, body language, asleep and dreaming, assertiveness training, how to get untight in an uptight world, human potential workshop, setting goals and reaching them, and Silva mind control. The fee is \$24 for the series. Persons may pick six of the eight topics to attend.

## 'Reading Process' is MACLD topic

The Michigan Association For Children With Learning Disabilities will host Dr. W. Dorsey Hammond in a free lecture at 8 p.m. Jan. 27 in Farmington Community Library on Twelve Mile. His topic is "The Reading Process."

Dr. Hammond has spoken in the International Reading Conference (IRA) and has written for journals on the subject. He is best known for his development of the "Directed Reading, Thinking, Activity Process." (DRTA) and is believer that everyone can learn to read.

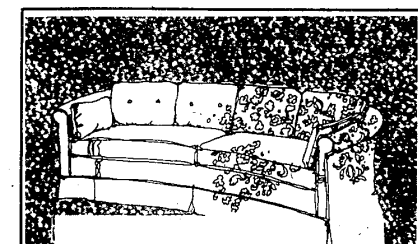
In his talk he will relate his theory on "how to make thinkers readers and get readers to thinking."

His lectures are geared "for whatever your role: special education teacher, classroom teacher, parent or student," said Ruth Schade, president of the Farmington chapter of MACLD.

Dr. Hammond is currently a professor of reading in Oakland University. He received his training at the University of Delaware, where he worked with Russell Stauffer, one of the six outstanding reading researchers in the United States.

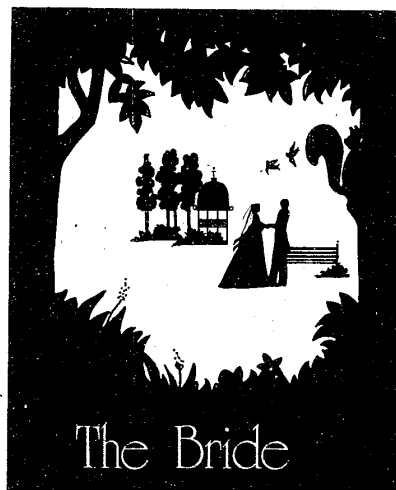
