## Patterson rips state parole laws

Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson has a lot to say about the state parole laws, and none of it; is good. He claims that by releas-

on 1/18 good. He claims that by releas-ing dangerous criminals premdurely, the parole system is working against the best interest of the people. Patterson made his remarks in an after-dinner speech at the annual Plymouth Jaycees Distinguished Serv-ice Awards bamquet. He told those pre-sent that the parole system was a fail-ure.

"We are being raped, robbed, and murdered by the same people over and over again," he said. "The parole system is an abysmal failure."

system is an abysmal failure."
His main complaint was criminals
who "had been convicted of violent
crimes were being released from prison by the parole board to rape, rob,
and-kill again.
To substantiate his claim, he cited
for "pages of documented cases of
crimes committed by criminals who
had-been parole defore they had served "fielt" minimum sentence.

PATTERSON TOLD the audience that his interest in parole abuse staffed when he was working on a case involving a murdered policeman. As the circumstances surrounding the ixiling unfolded, Patterson said, it was discovered that the murderers were parolees. One of them had been septenced to 15 to 25 years for murder and, was released after serving only solven and one-half years.

serve just their minimum sentence, that police officer would still be alive destanced to 30 to 35 years in jail According to Patterson he started keeping a record of all violent crimers that were committed by convicted criminals who were out on parcie. He said there have been 11 in Oakland Cointy alone since 1973.

The fault, Patterson alleges, lies in the parole laws, which allow prisoners to accumulate "good time"—a certain number of days taken off their sentence for each month they serve.

parole laws so people convicted of vio-tent crimes—rape, murder, and armed robbery— are required to serve their full minimum sentence. He said in 1973 he introduced just such a bill into the state legislature. But it has yet to be reported out of committee.

committee.
"The bill I introduced four years ago has died in committe twice." he said. "The legislature has refused to act. And I don't think it is too much to ask. Just make the violent criminal serve his minimum sentency."
