

# Grocer backs scholarship

Farmington area school supporters can line up at the A&P cash register, and be counted on Feb. 2.

That's the date the Farmington Area PTA Council Scholarship Fund will receive five per cent of the local grocery store's receipts. If that happens, an identification card from a local chapter of the school group.

"We're encouraging anyone who wants to support the school, including retired persons or persons who no longer live in the area, to get an identification card," said scholarship chairman Linda Rainford.

Identification cards can be obtained from a local chapter of the PTA. Mrs. Rainford and Donna Gembarski, PTA treasurer, are in charge.

Not all of the Farmington schools have a chapter of the PTA. Forest, Woodcreek and Shiawassee schools have PTO groups.

Persons from these schools who want to support the project can call their principal for the names of PTA officials.

"It's the only way they can obtain the cards," explained Mrs. Rainford, who belongs to Gill Elementary School PTA.

"WE CAN'T HAND OUT cards inside the door or outside of the A&P. Their national headquarters set it up so no one can solicit near the store," she explained.

The Farmington A&P, Farmington Road and Grand River, is the only participating supermarket.

Purchases of alcoholic beverages and tobacco are excluded from the program.

Any other purchase, regardless of price, will be counted in the program.

The PTA will receive its portion of the receipts within six weeks from A&P headquarters.

Although this is the first time the PTA has participated in the program, Mrs. Rainford hopes that it will be as successful as Longacre Elementary

School's fund drive at the store.

"They had their program in December and 80 per cent of the parents participated in it. They haven't received their money yet."

The Farmington Area PTA scholarship is given to one student in each of the local high schools.

Students receive \$150 for two semesters.

"It's to make sure that they get into school," Mrs. Rainford explained.

THE SCHOLARSHIPS are awarded on an individual basis. The student's scholastic record, financial need and citizenship are taken into consideration.

Most of the kids who apply are members of the band or in the honor society. They work part-time. They're all-around kids who want to go to college.

"But maybe they have four brothers in college already, and their parents can't afford another. We help them," she said.

The PTA counselors and high school principals appraise the applications.

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
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## Poster children
