The outcome was two resolutions. One for an emergency plan to help the world's poorest countries maintain essential imports during the year. The other set up an emergency fund. The US announced it would not contribute to the fund, but would continue aid through existing channels. U.S. delegates have since been concerned over a series of dramatic parliamentary triumphs by the Third World.

The Third World consists of the Mid-East (except Israel), Latin America, Africa and Asia, including China.

The local league is in hopes that the information it has garnered on this subject can be shared with interested citizens at this meeting, and another to follow it in March.
