## Highway fate lies in state's hands

The tempest surrounding the pro-posed extension of Northwestern High-way could be resolved during an up-coming meeting of the state highway commission. Chairman Peter Fletcher announced Friday the commission will tackle the Northwestern question at its 10 a.m. Wednesday, Feb. 23, session in Lan-sing.

At that time, the state highway can be partment will recommend whether or not to go ahead with the Northwestern project. Fletcher said.
In addition, the state autorney generals office will report the status of legal proceedings on the highway. These revolve around an Oakland County Road Commission suit against the state for delaying construction.

THE COMMISSION'S recent decision not to build M-275 inking 196 in Novi to 1-15 in Springfield Township has brought the Northwestern extension into the limelight.

The proposed extension, which has pitted area environmentalists against developers and the county road commission, was to have linked up with M-275. As it now stands, extension of Northwestern would dead-end into a black spruce bog.

Fletcher said the kinds of situations involved in M-275 decision would reap-

pear in the Northwestern case.
"I would say that M-275 would have an impact," Fletcher said.

GEORGE SNYDER, in the fore-front of the environmentalist stand against both M-273 and Northwestern, said his group "may want to appear at the meeting.
"We are in the process of studying the matter very carefully," he said, when informed of Fletcher's announce-ment.

Snyder said his group is up against proponents more formidable than proponents of 275.

"They are better organized and more powerful," he said. "M-275 was a brainchild of the highway department, Northwestern is the brainchild of developers."

MEANTIME, ALL OFFICIAL planning for the Northwestern extension is in abeyance until the commission makes a decision.

"I am sitting with my desk clean

and all my files on Northwestern closed," said Edward Kazenko, high-way department consultant to two committees studying the project. "It's an uncertain type of situation." Kazenko had a hand in cancelling February meetings of the Technical Advisory Committee (CAC) which just completed preparations for a Northwestern environmental impact study.

They were about to choose one or more consultants to carry it out.

Letters from William D. Wagoner, TAC chairman, and Walter Cisler, CAC head, mailed by the highway department, were identical:

"The February meeting . . is here-by cancelled. This cancellation is made necessary by the highway com-mission's decision to cancel the con-struction of M-275 . . . You will be no-tified of future meetings."

SNYDER, REPRESENTING the Eastern Michigan Environmental Action Council (EMEAC) on CAC, complained about the terse cancellation. "That's the extent of the communication of the department to the communitiet." Snyder said. "Many of us feel the department should at the very least explain to the public what they're considering."
