Jaycettes offer market to area handcrafters

The format is the same as that used by the local group for two pre-Christmas sales held in 1975 and 1976.

All proceeds will be earmarked for vocational scholarships and food baskets for the needy which are annual Jaycette community service projects.

The dean's list honors those students who have earned a B or better average during the semester.



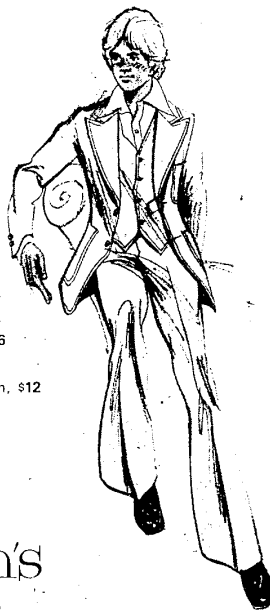
