TAX CUT: Rejected, 148 for and 258 TAX CUT: Rejected. 148 for and 258 against, an amendment to replace President Carter's plan for one-shot in-dividual tax rebates with a permanent across-the-board tax cut. Rep. John Kosselot (R-Calif 1, the sponsor, said: "The purpose of a per-manent tax rate reduction is to re-duce the tax bias against work, sav-ing and investment... to increase the reward to work, save and invest and to make it more desirable for people to invest and to hire unem-ployed and produce more real long-term jobs:

BUDGET: Adopted, 72 for and 20 against, S Con Res 110, the Senate's version of the fiscal 1977 budget changes necessary to accommodate President Carter's economic recovery blueprint. The Senate resolution was the same in approach as the house's, but differ-ed considerably on dollar amounts.
