Summer Busy For Troop

Boy Scouts of Farmington Troop 349 are having a busy time of it this summer. The week of Aug. 17-24 will find the boys camped in Kelso Recreation Area, near Milton, Ontario. By special invitation, the troop will be representing the United States at the Ontario Provincial Jamboree. During this event, the boys will join 16,000 Scouts from around the world in a week of activities and comradeship.

Troop 349's 30-piece band, directed by Lindsey Chalmers, will head up the jamboree's "Search for Talent" musical program. Handling other activities will be Scoutmaster George Fletcher, aided by assistant scoutmasters Jim Harsani, Chalmers, Chuck Willson and Bud Burgstahler, troop committee member.

The Canadian government has arranged special entertainment for the troop, including a trip to Niagara Falls and the Toronto Exhibition. Fifty-two boys will make the trip to the jamboree. Troop 349 spent the week of July 20-27 serving as Gov. Romney's Honor Guard and as guides at Fort Mackinac. The troop was only one of 12 given this honor, which it has had for two years and will have again next summer.

Fifty-six boys spent the week on the island under the leadership of the scoutmasters and assistants Chalmers, Willson, Fritz Kalney and Carl Deas. Fathers who helped during the week were Dick Patton, Dick Angelo, Jerry Vining, Bud Resume and Burgstahler. Food arrangements were handled by Art Sigle.

The troop band presented concerts each day on the island and at Marquette Park. By special request of the Mackinac Island Yacht Club, the band performed at the presentation of trophies to the winners of the Chicago to Mackinac Island yacht race.

Seek Data On Smoking

The identity of households interviewed is confidential and the information obtained will be used only for statistical purposes.

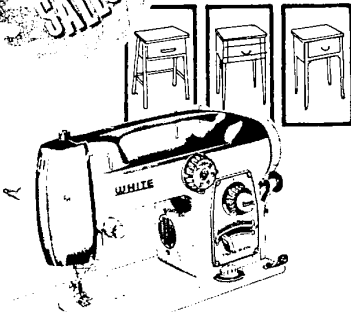

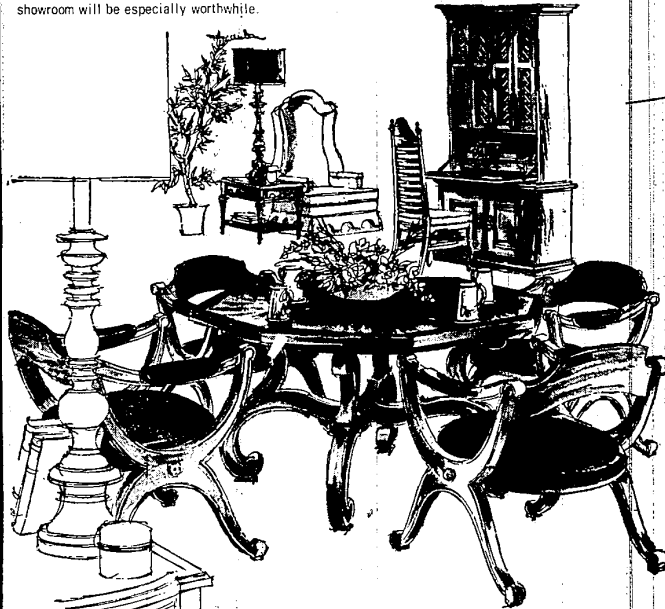
