Troop 389 Is Honor Guard

Arrest Youth For Obscenity

A Farmington Township youth charged with using obscene language was arraigned Monday morning and ordered to spend 15 days in jail and pay fines and costs totaling \$222.50.

Christopher G. Agar, 17, of 21520 St. Francis, was arrested Friday at the corner of Independence and Caldwell and charged on two counts: disorderly person and obscene language.

For the first charge, he was given 15 days and \$125 in fines and costs. Agar faces a maximum of 45 days in Oakland County Jail if none of the fines are paid.

Township Grants Hearing On Office Rezoning Request

The Farmington Township Board will hear Attorney Albert Herzog's case why the corner of Freedom Rd. and Gill Rd. should be rezoned to allow for the construction of a doctor's office on Aug. 26.

The rezoning request was denied by the Township Planning Commission in July. The property is currently zoned for single family homes.

Under the law any person being denied a request by the planners can appeal the decision to the township board. If the township board feels that the planner's decision was unjust then it will send the matter back to the planning commission with instructions.

At the time of the preliminary hearing by the planning commission a number of residents of the city—which abuts the property—were present to object to the rezoning. One of the factors behind the planners' denial of the request was that it would be placing a business zone in a residential area.

IN A RELATED rezoning matter, Township Supervisor Curtis H. Hall reported that he had received five letters objecting to the proposed rezoning in the Kendallwood Subdivision for the Farmington area YMCA.

The proposed property for the YMCA is just north of the Demery's Shopping Center and fronts on Tulipwood Drive.

In July the township planners approved the rezoning request.

The matter has been sent to the Oakland County Coordinating Committee which considers all rezoning matters before they go to the township board.

The Township board will make the final decision as the planning commission only recommends.
