up the elected officials to the appointed officials."

Aaron said the new raise for elected officials would give them increases totalling more than 50 per cent in five

years. Murphy, in response to a question, said there may be other "equity" raises sought next year, but nothing like the package passed at the April 12 meeting.

THE RAISE for managerial and spe-cialized personnel had slightly smooth-er sailing, passing 18-5. Republican Moxley switched and supported this measure, while Demo-cratic leader Pernick remained op-posed

Significantly, Democrat Perinoff, who rarely parts company with col-league Pernick, supported both pay raises. "Our elected officials have done tremendous jobs and have tre-mendous responsibilities. They should get salaries commensurate with the top echelon of administrative offi-cers." Perinoff said.
The equity package had been the subject of months of study in the per-sonnel committee, and amendments were made as late as last week.
