Anti-Semitism topic for JWF women

The women's division of the Jewish Welfare Federation will take a contemporary look at anti-Semitism at its annual Spring Forum on Thursday, April 28.

The program, titled "Apart...Or a Part of," will run from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Jewish Community Center, 6500 W. Maple in West Bloomfield.

In the morning session, 11 members of the spring forum committee will present three vignettes dramatizing instances of anti-Semitism. They are: Gloria Colton, Francine Gold, Marilyn Hartz and Anna Levin, all of Southfield; Renee Epstein and Dorene Finer, both of West Bloomfield; Trudy Foster and Sue Moss, both of Birmingham; Carol Krugel of Farmington; Margo Serlin of Oak Park and Dede Weinberg of Huntington Woods.

Discussion will follow each vignette. Robert Naftaly of Southfield, a member of the national executive committee of B'nai Brith AntiDefamation League, will moderate and respond to questions.

After lunch, Aaron D. Rosenbaum, director of research for the American Israel Public Affairs Committee and an editor of "Near East Report" will speak on the problems of anti-Semitism throughout the world.

Schoolcraft registration is April 28

Spring registration at Schoolcraft College will be held from noon to 7 p.m. on Thursday.

Registration is conducted in the auxiliary gym on the main campus at 18600 Haggerty, Livonia.

The first hour is reserved for spring graduates—those who will complete their programs of study during this session.

The rest of the registration period is assigned by this schedule: 1-3 p.m., student numbers 10,000 to 38,999; 3-5 p.m., student numbers 39,000 to 62,999; and 5-7 p.m., student numbers 63,000 to 99,999.

Students planning to attend Schoolcraft for the first time must be admitted to the college before registration can be completed. Admission information is available from the college at 591-6400 ext. 228.

The spring schedule offers nearly 200 day and night sections in 37 different subjects. Both transfer and career studies are included among the classes which will be taught both in Livonia and the instructional center in Garden City.

Tuition is \$13 a credit hour for residents of the Clarenceville, Garden City, Livonia, Northville and Plymouth-Canton school districts. Non-resident tuition is \$26 a credit hour.
