

# Ward Bible Study Class Begins New Season Sept. 9

A Bible class that began in a Livonia basement 12 years ago begins its new season at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, Sept. 9, in Ward United Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. Bartlett L. Hess, well-known educator and wife of the minister of the Livonia Church, will continue to teach the Community Bible Class she founded in 1957.

The church is located at Farmington Road and Six Mile. Last year some 300 women from more than 20 denominations and religious groups attended. Presbyterian, Methodist, United Church of Christ, Baptist, Lutheran, Jewish, Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox and Christian Science were among the sects represented.

THE BIBLE CLASS will be studying the life of Christ as found in the four Gospels.

# Foster Homes Needed Now!

More families willing to adopt "hard to place" children are being sought by Michigan Children's Aid Society, non-sectarian agency.

Included in this category are children beyond infancy - black, bi-racial and handicapped youngsters.

A total of 1737 unvetted mothers have been assisted by the MCAS from Jan. 1 through July, and 89 children were placed for adoption with 98 families during this same time this year.

Of the 1737 unvetted mothers receiving assistance, 59 were under age 15. The 15-to-17 age group accounted for 422, those 18 and 19 included 492, age 20 had 202 and 562 were 21 or over, according to Albert Morris, executive director.
