Monday was Mrs. Charles Ely's birthday and her children and grandchildren helped her celebrate the occasion, 15 being present for supper.

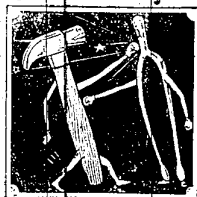
