

# More Volunteers Needed To Help Troubled Youth

Churches and their members still are a largely untapped source of both energy and funds for the many human needs of our society, believes Judge Arthur E. Moore of Oakland County Circuit Court.

"Christian service is, in my mind, what churches are for," the long-time authority on juvenile problems told a state convention of Big Sisters at the Westerns Golf and Country Club, Redford Township, Wednesday.

"Many of our church members have waked up suddenly to Detroit's troubles and want to get into the act because consciences bother them," he added.

"But I'd like to see more people who are doing service work like that of the Big Sisters speak in Sunday morning services when there are many church members present. I'd like to have you tell them how much good can be accomplished."

Statistics showing half the felonies in Michigan are committed by persons under 18. He also said projections show that if the increase in juvenile crime continues at its present rate, by 1970 one in every six youngsters will have had some brush with the law.

"For every volunteer we now have," he said, "we could use four or five more in terms of the number of youngsters who need help."

THE PROBATE JUDGE added that no one should make the mistake of thinking "the delinquency problem in Michigan is going to be solved by having the state build more facilities."

"If you're going to change a youngster's life," he emphasized, "you must change the community in which he lives. That means finding people who can make these changes."

Eugene Moore listed four common denominators he's found in the backgrounds of youths who have come into his court.

"They come from inadequate homes," he stated. "The reasons for inadequacy may be different in different communities—but too many children and too little money or too much money

and too little interest.

"Second, all are retarded—not in ability but in achievement. They know they are going to fail.

"Third, they don't participate in activities—their parents never have seen the importance of school activities and groups like Boy and Girl Scouts.

"Fourth, practically all have had no religious training. The few who had contact with churches were 'drop-outs'—their parents dropped them off at church and went on to other entertainments."

THE JUVENILE JUDGE pointed out that it costs \$8,000 a year to keep each inmate in state prisons in Michigan.

"The pitiful thing about that cost is that when these prisoners are paroled 70 percent go back in the institution in five years," he added.

"By contrast, when we work with youngsters who violate the law we can point to records of 85 per cent success."

BOTH JUDGES stated up the great good that can be done for youths when someone just shows some interest in them.

Judge Arthur Moore told of having a man offer him in his home over a Christmas holiday and said that during the stay he "just disappeared for a day."

"I told him how worried and disappointed I was, and his answer was quite revealing," the judge said.

"He told me 'I didn't think you cared.'"

Judge Eugene Moore added: "There are youngsters on every side of us who need people like us—people who care about their life's most important ingredient, love."
