Shower chairman Mrs. Nicholas Hood has asked guests to bring dolls, books, records, wooden puzzles, trucks, trains and other equipment to the new Child Care Center at 920 Putnam for children of women attending classes at Wayne State University.

The licensed center, sponsored by Women of Wayne Alumni, will offer supervised activities for ages 2 1/2 through six at St. Andrew's Church on the campus.

"You probably are acquainted with many mothers who are anxious to return to college, but who do not have the funds to provide adequate care for their pre-school children while they are attending classes," said Mrs. Hood in a letter of invitation to the shower.
