for plaintiffs within fifteen days after
service upon them, or their attorneys,
of a copy of said Bill, and in default thereof,
that said Bill be taken as confessed by
the said defendants who shall fail to com-
ply with the requirements of this order.

the said plaintiffs cause this Order to be
published in the Farmington Enter-
prise, a newspaper printed, published and
circulating in said County and that said
publication be commenced within twenty
days from the date of this order and that
such publication be continued therein
once in each week for six weeks in suc-
cession, or that said plaintiffs cause a copy
of this Order to be personally served upon
each of said defendants named herein, at
least twenty days before the time pre-
scribed for their appearance.
