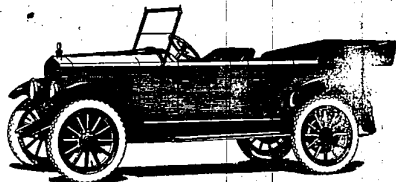

Duffield Bigelow will soon move on the farm that he recently purchased from Seymour Seeley.

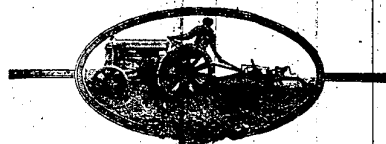
Mrs. Clemens, of Franklin, spent a few days last week with her daughter, Mrs. Harry Rayner.

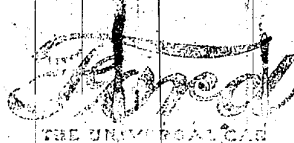
