Joe Peterson, of Milford, was in town last week Wednesday, and installed the officers of the Novi Grange in a very pleasing manner.

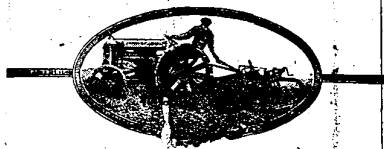
Mrs. Jessie Clark visited her daughter in Detroit last week.

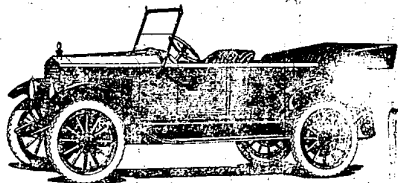
