day at the Forest Pierson home.

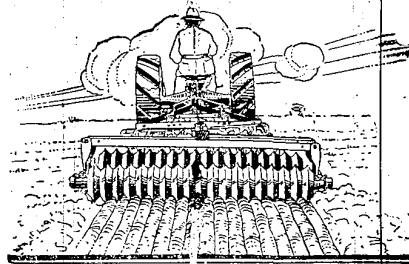
Miss Julia Webster, of Pontiac,
