Hamilton Jones was entertained on Sunday at the home of Lyle Dickie, near Orchard Lake.

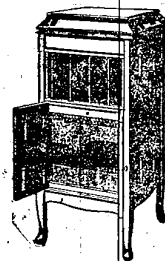
