Alden Green is on the sick list. Miss Ethel Seeley is spending a few weeks in Detroit.

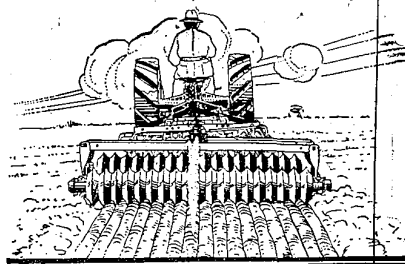
