Evangelism Congress Calls For Greater Compassion

Urgent calls for Christian compassion to underscore verbal proclamation of the Gospel characterized the first international U.S. Congress on Evangelism in Minneapolis. The six-day event was the largest in modern evangelistic history. Some 5,000 delegates from 95 denominations, including several local clergymen, attended. "What we are saying is that

the world's only real hope is Christ," said Dr. Oswald C.J. Hoffman, "the Lutheran Hour" radio preacher and congress keynote. Hoffman told the delegates, "If you have come here with a passion for Christ but little compassion for people, I pray that you will find something here -- that has heretofore escaped you. If you have come here with

a burning feeling for people and little confidence that Christ is the answer to the world's problems, feeling directly with the deepest problem of waywardness and rebellion against God, I trust that here you will make the biggest discovery of your life. The need for social concern was expressed repeatedly during the congress, and was interpreted by many as representing a major new development among theologically conservative Protestants, known among themselves as evangelicals. The Rev. Tom Skinner, a black evangelist from New York, urged the predominantly white audience to be willing to make severe sacrifices to combat racism. "The role of the church is to live oblivious to public opinion," he said. Skinner, a 27-year-old former Harlem gang leader, was given a standing ovation. In tracing the history of the oppression of blacks in America, Skinner noted that they continue to stand for American ideals in war as well as peace. "You must remember," he said, "that it is not the black soldier who is burning his draft card and running off to Canada. Dr. Harold Lindell of Washington, D.C., editor of Christianity Today, made a public appeal to President Nixon to call for a special national day of prayer for an end to the war in Vietnam. "We've tried everything else," he said, "we've tried force, we've tried diplomacy, and we've tried psychology. But we haven't tried prayer." Sen. Mark Hatfield said he takes issue with those who reject any responsibility for overcoming the obstacles to peace simply because sin is a reality. "He cited the obstacles as deprivation, suffering, hunger, alienation from God and man, lack of dignity, and oppression. "The call to evangelize is a call to proclaim and to love," he declared. "It is a call to respond to these needs, and it involves us totally in the mandate of peacemaking." The congress was an outgrowth of the World Congress on Evangelism held in Berlin in the fall of 1966. Several national and regional congresses have been held since, and more are planned.

Two faculty members from the Great Lakes Bible College, Mary Aikey and Mary Hargrave, will lead the clinic.

Topics that will be considered include: "Teacher and Lesson Preparation," "Setting a Standard for the Bible School," "Lesson Aims in Teaching," "Teaching Methods," "How to Lead Congregational Singing," "How to Start a Youth Choir," "Using Church Music for Preschoolers and Primaries," and "Using Church Music for Juniors."

MOTHER WADDLES opened her Perpetual Mission June 6, 1958, serving the first of her now famous 35-cent meals. Since then, her work has expanded to include a food and clothing emergency bank, hair cuts, free medical care, a halfway house for the out-patients from Northville State Hospital, and a training program.

At the Perpetual Mission, all who come are helped through the programs conducted there. In reference to work, Mother Waddles says, "Mine is a religious concept for everyday living for the total man -- not just the spiritual, but the physical as well."

LJC Youth Trim For Feast

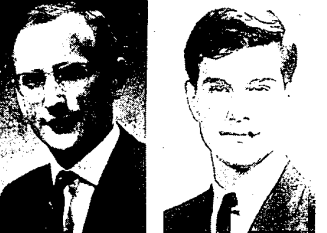

of the AYD, recently incorporated in Michigan as a non-profit organization, said admission to the 3 to 5 p.m. rally will be free. A parade of antique and new model cars, floats, marching high school bands, fire and police bands, the Detroit Edison Co. calliope, the Red Guard fire engine and the Dixieland band, will be among the parade units leaving Grand Circus Park at 2 p.m. for a march down Woodward to Cobo Arena. The parade will begin marshaling

on Woodward and Adams at 12:30 p.m. The Irish Rovers, in Detroit for a Sunday night concert at Ford Auditorium, will appear at the rally as part of the entertainment. So will Bibba and The Avant-Garde, a folk-rock recording group for Columbia Records; a 1,000 voice choir selected from many church groups directed by Max Dancy; and Up With People, nationally-known and televised teen entertainers.
