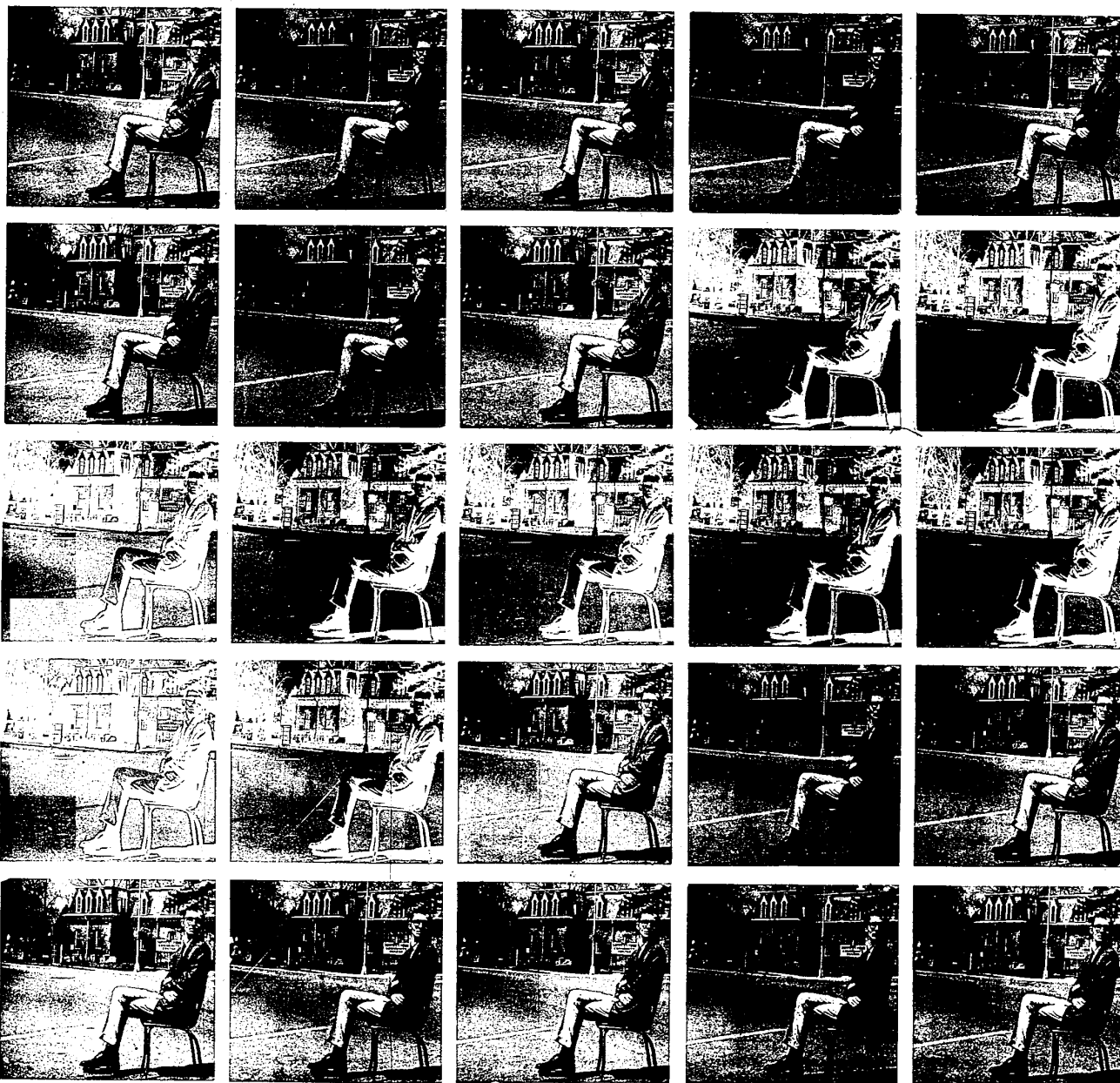


Keeping up with Farmington is a 25 hour a day job.
