Cecil Adams, of Detroit, is visiting his brother Jerome Adams and family.

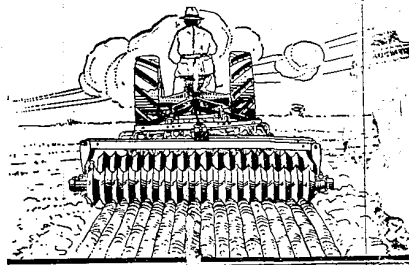
