Channel 20 reaches about 7,000 omes and one million viewers a week Larger Detroit stations, in comparison, may reach four or five million viewers.

"Ours has been starting from the bottom," Johnson said. "But we're taking solid steps—avoiding the lily pads and stepping on the rocks."
The station is planning to increase its power output and may convert partially to become a pay-TV station.

"A lot of people don't have outside antennas. They don't even have hoops for the UHF." Johnson said.
