Inspiration came from a true story

Former Detroiter Milan Stitt is the successful playwright whose heavy drama "The Runner Stumbles" continues its Michigan premiere run through March 19 at Meadow Brook Theatre.

Interviewed recently in the Green Room of the theater, on the Oakland University campus, the 37-year-old playwright was just as happy to recall fond memories in the Detroit metro-politan area as he was to discuss his

tage achievements. Stitt said he first lived in Detroit and

later, after his parents moved to Pon-tiac, "sold popcorn at the Miracle Mile." Stitt's father, Howard, and stepmother, Madeline, now live in Bir-

Stepmoner, brauemer, now are in En-mingham.
"The Runner Stumbles," a searing drama of a priest and num in an iso-lated northern Michigan community, ran six months on Broadway last year. "It has had 1,000 productions around the world since then," Stitt said.

STITT BASED his play on the true story of a priest who went on trial for the death of a young nun.

"It intrigued me how such a thing could have happened," he said. It happened, according to Stitt, because of "containment." Stitt said he wanted to discover what kind of man would be involved in a situation that would en

vengeance and love—as it is a love story, he said.
Describing himself as "a fallen-away Methodist," housed his imagination to fill out the play's dramatic details. He read actual court transcripts later, out of curiousity, and found six lines that were identical to coes in his script, where the control of the church ready is on a hill looking down at he town. For me, it works metaphorically."

Stitt said the town where the incident happened, at the turn of the century, was named Isadore. Because of the play, tourists have been flocking there and the town changed its name.
