Pontiac Central rips Andover

A sign on the wall at Pontiac Central's gymnasium read: "The Chiefs are on the loose."

That was no understatement. Led by seniors Ray Bell, reserve Gerry Causey and Walker D. Russell, Pontiac Central rolled to an easy 96-47 victory over an emotionally drained Bloomfield Hills Andover team Tuesday.

The preseason favorite to win the coveted Class A title, Pontiac Central looked as if they were right on schedule for the crown in downing the undermanned Andover squad.

"We did not handle the situation at all," said a reflective Andover coach John Maloney.

According to Maloney, it was not Andover's plan to get into a running game with the Chiefs, but they did.

"We had no pose on offense and we had no intentions of playing their tempo," said Maloney.

"We wanted to get the ball inside," he said.

With 4:20 to go in the first quarter, Andover's Galen Davis hit a long-range jumper to put the Barons within two, 10-8.

It was the closest Andover got in the game.

In the final four minutes of the first period, Pontiac Central outscored

Andover, 19-4, to take a commanding 29-12 first quarter advantage.

NOT KNOWING WHEN to let up, the Chiefs increased their halftime lead to 46-21.

Bell, a 6-2 guard, netted all of his 17 points in the first half. The much-heralded Russell, brother of the Cleveland Cavaliers' Campy Russell, had six of his 12 points in the first two periods.

The lightning-quick Central guards repeatedly got past their Andover defenders for easy layups.

Content on shooting the 20-30 foot jump shot, Andover fell quickly behind.

Pontiac Central's 6-4 junior center Clyde Carter made the Chiefs main force on the defensive boards as he got the ball out quickly to his teammates for their fast break.

"This was definitely not a positive game for us, and we played like we were just starting the season," Maloney said.

Andover hoped to erase the 25-point halftime deficit, but the Barons came out cold in the second half as the Chiefs hit everything they threw up toward the basket.

Coach Ralph Grubb's squad blitzed Andover, 24-4, in the third quarter letting everyone in the stands know they are for real.

"It was critical to get off to a good

start in the second half, but we remained hesitant," said Maloney.

Six Pontiac Central players got into the scoring act in the third quarter as Grubb then began to use his substitutes.

DAVID AND SOPHOMORE forward Tim Meter provided much of the offensive punch for Andover, scoring 16 and 13 points respectively.

In the fourth period, reserve guard Causey got hot, as he hit for 10 straight points before Davis broke the ice for Andover with 5:59 left.

Causey had 16 points on the evening with Russell getting 12 to support Bell's game-high 17.

All but two of Pontiac Central's players inserted into the contest scored.

Both teams continued to run up the points in the fourth period with the Chiefs outscoring Andover, 26-22.

Andover reserves Steve Games and

Dave Tietmeyer both cracked the scoring column in the fourth quarter.

"It was a learning experience for us, and you must learn to win in every situation," said Maloney.

"We're still going to walk out of here with our heads up," Maloney said.
