

## Fashion benefit to aid bone disease

"Fashions from the Islands" is the theme of a benefit fashion show for the Osteogenesis Imperfecta Foundation. The event is set for 6:30 p.m. April 12 at the Raleigh House in Southfield.

Sponsor of the fundraiser is the American Association of Medical Assistants (AAMA). About one out of every 50,000 babies is born with this genetic defect known as brittle bone disease.

The condition is characterized by fragility of the bones, blue coloring in the whites of the eyes, excessive perspiration, loose joints, poor teeth and respiratory problems. Cases vary widely from mild cases where a fracture occurs days, months or even years after birth, to extremely severe cases.

Researchers are working to determine the cause of the disorder.

Doctors and members of the AAMA will model men's fashions provided by Pricers of Dearborn and women's fashions from the Mann-Ann Shop of Dearborn Heights.

Hosting the affair will be Jo-Jo Shuttty McGregor and Byron McGregor. Door prizes to be awarded include a weekend for two at the Michigan Inn in Southfield, and a golfing weekend for two at Schuss Mountain Lodge in Manicoua.

## Summer camp program planned by Akiva

## TV talk host will speak

Nationally known TV talk show host Barry Farber, will speak at the 12th Annual Bnai Brith Presidents Brunch at 9:30 a.m. April 2 at Adat Shalom Synagogue in Farmington Hills.

## LA Times man will speak

Robert C. Toth, Washington Bureau Chief of the Los Angeles Times, will speak on his experiences as Moscow Bureau Chief at 8 p.m. on Wednesday, April 5.

Toth's talk before the Metropolitan-Detroit Chapter of Hadassah will be a Congregation Shaarey Zedek in Southfield. It will be sponsored by the Irwin Cohen Family Foundation for an "Education Meeting."

Prior to leaving Moscow, after three years there, he was questioned for nearly 14 hours by the KGB (Soviet Secret Police) on charges of collecting secret political and military information, but was allowed to leave after his prolonged ordeal.

Officials interpreted the episode as a standoff, in which the Soviet authorities let Toth go only after achieving their apparent purpose of intimidating US newsmen in Moscow.

President Inge Kramer of Southfield said the lecture is open to the public.

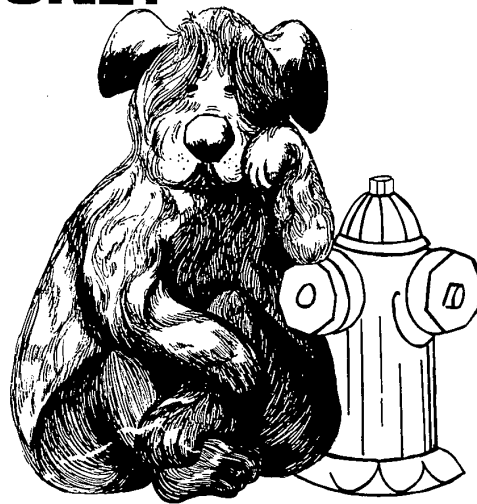
