

## 4-H talent fair planned April 7

The Oakland 4-H Youth Program and the West Bloomfield School District community education department will co-sponsor the 4-H Share-the-Fun talent show at 7:30 p.m. Friday, April 7, in the West Bloomfield High School auditorium, Orchard Lake and Green roads.

The program provides youth enrolled in 4-H the opportunity to display their creative abilities in dance, drama, vocal and comedy areas. For the second year 4-H youth will also be able to exhibit original art work in the foyer of the auditorium.

Judging of the Share-the-Fun program results in the presentation of special awards and place rosettes, with the top five acts given the opportunity to perform at a district contest and finalists appearing at 4-H Youth Exploration Days held at Michigan State University in June.

Coordinating the program is Loraine Hoxie of West Bloomfield.

Master of ceremonies will be 4-H Challenge Club leader, Marquis Smith of Royal Oak. Judging the program will be Lester Schick, Wayne County 4-H agent; Cathy Alberg of Sylvan Lake, a former middle school drama coach; and Mrs. Barbara Theurer of Oxford, a fourth grade teacher and past choir director.

The judges will be rating the participants on the basis of talent, stage presence, audience response, originality and costuming.

During the judging intermission, punch and cookies will be served by Paula Comps and members of the Oakland County 4-H Service Club. The audience will also be entertained by cartoon films provided by the Wayne County Federated Library System. There is no admission charge and the public is invited to attend.

# Hair is bouncy and free

Spring hairstyles split to the side under the comb of hair stylist Michel Kazan.

Just returned from Paris, Kazan said "the mood in Paris is decontraste—relaxed." The mood inspired his spring designs of soft, free and flowing hair.

"Nothing is planned," said the New York based Kazan. "Hair is undone, yet controlled, healthy looking, bouncy and free."

Center-parts will be worn with hair flowing downward or sides swept up and secured with barrettes or mobile hair ornaments. Full-feathered wisps cover the head. Or hair is upswep with loosely-hanging tendrils falling from the crown or nape.

Also new, he said, is healthy glowing hair falling gently to the shoulders with hair-knots framing the brow.

THE HOLDING POWER for Kazan's styles, which he calls "heavy stuff" is the "relax cut." When the hair is wet, he cuts it in a circular motion allowing the hair to relax in a free and flowing movement, no matter what its length.

Hair color this spring, he said, is highlighted in pastel shades including pale blondes, shimmering reds, delicate browns, soft brunettes and sun-kissed streaks.

"This spring, doing what comes naturally for hair and makeup is the look that is just right for women of all ages" said Kazan. He selected fashions by Julio to compliment his hair designs.

Kazan will be at his salon at Bonwit Teller, Troy to present his "heavy stuff" collection on April 10 and 11. He said he welcomes consultations with his clients.

Miss Raymonde, Kazan's makeup expert, will also be on hand to advise you.

## Archeologist talks at Shaarey Zedek

Cyrus H. Gordon, famed archeologist, will speak at Congregation Shaarey Zedek at 8 p.m. Tuesday, April 4, on "The Excitement of our Current Archeological Findings."

Gordon lectures and writes on many aspects of the Near East, where he has lived and worked for many years.

Archeological assignments have taken him to Ur, Tepe Gawra and Tell Billa in Iraq, to Tell Beit Mirsim and Beth-Zur in Israel and to Ader in Jordan. He also has worked in Egypt, Sinai, Syria, Lebanon, Iran, Turkey and Greece. He served in the Persian Gulf Command during the Second World War.

His lectures on archeology cover the latest discoveries including the Ebla Archives.

He also speaks on Israeli-Arab affairs against a background of long acquaintance with Hebrew and Arabic history, language and, above all, people.

Formerly chairman of the department of Mediterranean studies at Brandeis University, Gordon is now professor of Hebrew studies at New York University. He has lectured all over this country as well as in Latin America, Europe, the Near East, Far East and Australia.

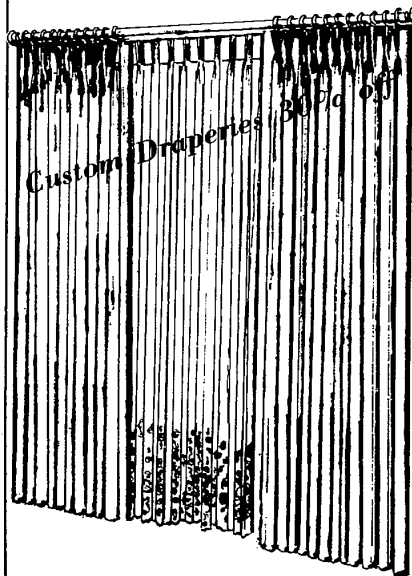
His books include "The Ancient Near East" and "The Common Background of Greek and Hebrew Civilizations." As the author of "Ugaritic Textbook" he also lectures on Ugarit and how it has revolutionized Biblical studies.

His "Evidence for the Minoan Language" has given rise to a lecture for people who like academic controversy.

This lecture, the second in the Shaarey Zedek spring lecture series, is under the auspices of the congregation's cultural commission and is sponsored by the Berry family. There is no admission fee.
